Manitoba Home Funeral Documentation Pathway

Part 1 - Registration of Death Form

Personal (biographical) particulars provided by family to Funeral Director / Event Registrar who files Part 1 and Part 2 with Vital Statistics. You may file Part 1 after it is given to you by Hospital Event Registrar.

Part 2- Medical Certificate of Death Form

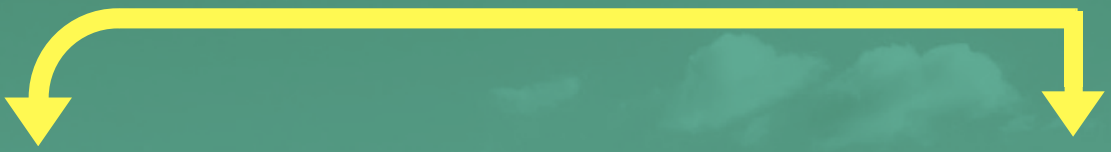
Provided by and signed by the Physician or the Chief Medical Examiner's office. Can sometimes take up to 48 - 96 hours to be issued. If the death occurred in hospital, a release form must be signed by Next of Kin before releasing the deceased to you.

Event Registrar

A Funeral Director always will, and a Hospital clerk MAY act in this capacity. After receiving biographical 'particulars' Registrar completes Part 1 and MD's portion - Part 2. Hospital MAY give you own transport form and day later the completed Part 1 and Burial/Cremation permit for the final transport. You would mail given copy of Part 1 to Vital Stats to fully register death to receive the Death Certificate.

Burial/ Cremation Disposition Permit

Issued by the Temporary Event Registrar (on behalf of Vital Statistics) after the death has been medically certified and registered. You will need to keep the Disposition Permit with the body during transport to cemetery or crematorium.



Transporting a deceased within MB requires NO PERMITS. Secure the container in place as not to become a safety hazard to occupants of vehicle. Out of province transport requires embalming and authorization from Coroner.

Once the death has been registered with Vital Statistics you can order Death Certificates. You will need these to close the estate, apply for death benefits, close out insurance, etc.



Cremation

You will need to find a 'cooperating' crematory to deliver deceased to... along with the Cremation (Disposition) Permit. Ensure your casket and lining meets the crematorium's by-laws.

Burial / Entombment

You will need to take the Burial Permit with you to the cemetery for burial. The cemetery operators need advanced notice of the burial and will have fees and contract for you to sign. You need to ensure if you are providing your own casket that it meets with their cemetery by-laws.
